President's Message

For some time—at least two years that I know of—the Board has had concerns regarding the continued use of "the barn" for equipment storage. This property is not common property to Saddle Ridge. The Davis' (DCA, Inc) own the property and Jack Davis has allowed us to use the property for storage, community gardens, etc. Both of the elder Davis' are having significant health problems and no longer live here in Saddle Ridge. Bottom line: the continued use of "the barn" is uncertain at best. Given the fact that we have two tractors that are used for road maintenance plus associated peripheral equipment, we believe that the prudent course of action is to purchase a small lot in Saddle Ridge and be prepared to move our equipment there if and when that is necessary. (In case you are wondering whether we could buy "the barn" property, that has been proposed in the past and DCA has been unwilling to sell.)

Our approach so far has been to form a Property Purchase Committee to investigate the availability and cost of an appropriate piece of property. Appropriate for us is defined as 1) not too costly, 2) relatively centrally located, 3) good long term value, and 4) enough level land to construct a building to house our equipment, with good access to the road.

We maintain hope that we will be able to continue our use of "the barn" property and that ultimately we will be able to convert the ownership of that land to Saddle Ridge. If and when we have that assurance we would then sell the property that we had acquired for equipment storage. In such an event, with the expected appreciation of that property we should show a positive return on our investment.

Regarding the terms of purchase, we would place a reasonable amount of money down on the property and mortgage the balance. This would allow us to maintain our cash reserves and would spread the majority of the cost of the property over all future property owners.

This is a major financial step forward for Saddle Ridge. However, the Board unanimously believes that this is a step we must take to assure the commitments—short and long term— that we as Board members have to all property owners. Maintaining the viability of our community and the supporting infrastructure is an absolute necessity.

We welcome any and all comments. Please contact any of the Board members; our phone numbers are on the back page of this Rambler.

Financial Report

As of April 8, 2008 the Saddle Ridge POA had \$19,614.60 in its checking account and had Certificates of Deposit totaling \$61,986.83. The delinquent HOA fees total \$13,180.62.



The SRPOA revenues for the year to date total \$53,207.52. Expenses to date total \$14,705.32.

The preliminary audit has been completed and the necessary information to complete the final audit has been forwarded to our accounting firm. The final, full audit will be completed and available at the Annual Meeting.

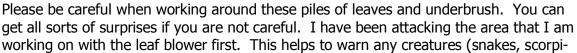

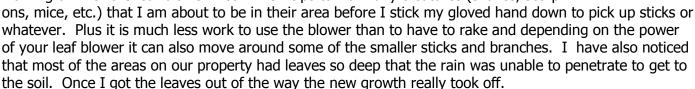


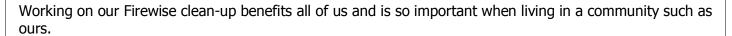
COMMITTEE REPORTS — continued

We are also going to try to re-route the rain water that runs down the roads past the lake and into the stream below the dam. We believe that this will solve much of the silt runoff problem that is polluting Reed Creek.

The market has been experiencing a "Perfect Storm "- Mortgage foreclosures, poor economic outlook, and tightened lending guidelines have created a buyers market for the foreseeable future. The National Association of REALTORS expects the real estate market to recover in the second half of 2008. The good news is that fixed mortgage interest rates are affordable.

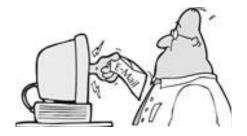
Currently Saddle Ridge has five homes for sale ranging in price from \$299-799K. The current homes listed range in size from a 1 bedroom with a loft to as large as 4,000 heated and cooled square feet. The most recent home sale was a 4 bedroom/3 bath home that sold for \$485,000 with exceptionally good mountain views.

Lot prices are trending upward for lots with good building sites, utilities to the lot, and good views, and no lot line disputes with the Park Service or Homestead. Few of these lots remain on the market. Another 30 or so lots are for sale that do not meet these criteria.

Increased real estate activity is expected as warmer weather, tourists, and the summer buying season arrive.

One Homeowner's Experience With Hemlock Wooly Adelgids – Phil Spampinato

Last fall I treated every hemlock that I could find on my property with "dormant" oil. This treatment was suggested to me by property owner Curtis Casciano and also by an old friend who told me about dormant oil years ago for treating fruit trees before their buds open in the spring. Dormant oil is miscible with water and costs less than one dollar per ounce. It is environmentally safe and works by smothering small pests by coating them with this extremely fine oil.

I mixed 1-tablespoon per gallon of water in my (hand pressurized) pump sprayer and simply sprayed the hemlocks. My pump sprayer will spray up to about 10-feet high, so any adelgids above that height will continue to thrive. But, I did observe that the wooly nests seem to start at the bottom of the trees so spraying lower branches (as high as the spray reaches) probably will save the larger trees unless they are already infected above the spray height limit. This is a time-consuming operation that took me about six hours to complete, but since it was an opportunity to walk on virtually my entire 5-acres it was worth the effort to explore the grounds. At a minimum, this should be done in spring and fall.

Random Issues, Complaints and Requests

<u>Speeding:</u> This is still an ongoing problem. We have had two complaints from residents of SR about other residents driving too fast on our gravel roads.

Security: No security issues have been brought up recently.

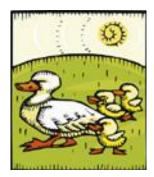

<u>Recycle:</u> Did you know that there is a dumpster for cardboard recycling behind the Walland post office? I still see a lot of cardboard boxes in the trash building (including ones that aren't broken down....!), and maybe people just can't be bothered to take them down the road, but if people would recycle it would be a good thing for the planet and it would reduce the amount of garbage we have to pay to get hauled away.....? And the signs that say do not enter are for cars, not people, the dumpster can be used by everybody.
