Firewise Community in Good-Standing

The Saddle Ridge annual Firewise report was accepted on November 12, 2019. To remain a community in good-standing we needed to invest \$1,907.25. Community members reported \$28,348.53 in time invested in Firewise activities such as creating defensible space around homes and clean up around the community. *Thank you to everyone!*

Firewise Grant for 2019-2020

Saddle Ridge received a \$3,300 grant for hazard mitigation and education. We plan to spend the \$500

education portion on the purchase of a Fire Danger Sign. The \$2,800 balance will be spent on bush hogging and the purchase of a come-a-long.

Treasurer's Report

Financial Reporting Update. The financial statements for the 1st Quarter of FY 2019 (July 1 to September 30) were sent November 1 to all owners for whom we have an email address. If you did not receive a copy, please contact us at saddleridgepoa@gmail.com and one will be sent to you. Collections of annual assessments are coming in at a good rate. Still, there are 24 members that haven't paid yet. The invoices were mailed on June 30 with a due date of July 31. Your account is delinquent if you don't pay within 60 days of the due date, or by September 30. If you haven't paid yet, please do so as soon as possible. Reminder letters will be sent in early January to the members that have not yet paid. Expenditures are approximately on budget, with a few areas running a bit over budget. However, there are still 7 months in the fiscal year, and we are reasonably certain that we will meet our revenue and expenditure goals.

Reflectors were also installed on some of the steeper curves along Chilhowee.
