# Make It a BearWise Spring



## **Talking Trash**

Empty bottles, cans, and bags still smell like food and anything that holds garbage emits smells that can attract bears. Give all your containers a good bath and spray inside with a disinfectant or ammonia. Don't use scented can liners or air fresheners; they smell appealing to bears too.

## Lock It or Lose It

In early spring, most bears are still losing weight and working hard to find food. Don't place your trash bags or bins outside the house/garage before taking them to the trash barn and ALWAYS latch the barn after your drop-off.

## **Spring Cleaning Check List**

## 1. Patios and Decks

Bits of food left on the grill grates or in the fire pit ashes are still appealing. Now is the time to to give your grill a good spring cleaning. Check under decks and porches to make sure nothing edible is stashed down there.

If a bear moved in over the winter, call your state wildlife agency and your community board.

#### 2. Pet Food

Store pet food where bears can't see, smell, or reach it (on or under your deck or inside your screened-in porch doesn't count.) Feeding pets outside isn't recommended in the community.

#### 3. Bird Feeders

Feeding birds up here isn't recommended either, but if you've been feeding birds over the winter, stop putting out birdseed and treats for now while bears are active.

And if you assume the "bear-safe 10ft pole birdfeeders" will be enough, you haven't met our local momma bear - she is smarter than the average bear!

#### 4. Garages and Sheds

Check through the garage and shed for anything that could attract a bear. If you stored your summer gear here, now is the time to clean out back packs and bike bags from any errant snack bars or scented lip balm.

#### 5. Cars and Trucks

Bears can be attracted to anything that held food or drinks. They can get into most unlocked vehicles, but have a harder time getting themselves out. Again, spring cleaning is the name of the game and using a small litter bag or wastebasket in the vehicle will make it easier to keep it attractant-free. Fruity air fresheners attract bears; odorless or pine-scented are better.

## **Need an Extension Cord?**

Neighbors, after going thru and cleaning out the Christmas decorations, I came up with an abundance of extension cords. We decorated the barn in earlier years. Below is a list of them. The Board has decided to sell them for a reasonable donation "your decision". You can take whichever ones you want. At this time all our light strings work so your donation would be banked and used when needed to replace ones that burn out. Anything left will be donated to Habitat.

Here is a list of the cords by number of sockets and/or cords contained, and length:

- 1 1 plug in with 3 sockets 6 feet
- 1 1 plug in with 3 sockets on separate cords 2 feet
- 1 1 plug in with 3 sockets on separate cords 10 feet

- 1 Ext. cord 20 feet
- 3 Ext. cords 8 feet
- 1 Ext. cord 25 feet
- 1 Ext. cord 15 feet
- 1 Ext. cord 50 feet
- 1 Ext. cord 75 feet

# **Road Report**

Over time, road traffic pushes the gravel from the road, as well as heavy rains. I put the Saddle Ridge tractor to use with the land planer implement to pull rock from the edge of the roads where possible and help smooth out the roads. The chipper attachment was used to chip the debris pile at the barn. Thanks to Tim Hollifield and Michael Gass for participating in the cleanup. The mower deck was also then used to mow the meadow – a shout out to Alex Wyss for his help in switching out the tractor implement.

If you've driven on Chilhowee Road, you likely have seen the safety cones at the switchback. Work is being done there to clear the clogged drainage culvert. Lamar brought in his backhoe and cleared debris to locate the high end of the culvert, and Lisa and I cleared above it to improve water flow to the culvert. Steve Foster and I will be trying the "pull-a-tire-through-the pipe" approach to clear rocks and branches from the inside of the culvert. Once that's done, additional rock (rip rap) will be added at the edge of the road to help prevent dirt and debris from filling back in. Thanks for your patience until this project is completed.
