Roads

I'm here today to talk about something that, as Road Committee Chair, has become near and dear to my heart. That's right, I'm talking about washboard roads.

Washboarding is the phenomenon where vehicles traveling over a flat but non-solid surface, like a gravel or sandy road, will gradually make ripples in the road.

Googling around a little, opinions differ a bit over the exact cause of washboarding. Welcome Home - The "Duck Inn"

In the Fall of 1999, as I rode in the back of my family's truck, I got my first glance of the Duck Inn. It was the same trip where my parents, Doug and Janie Shaffer, discovered the little cabin built over the creek on Chilhowee Loop. Our family couldn't resist the pull that these mountains placed on our hearts, and the Duck Inn will always be a part of that special memory of that first visit to SR.

Now, as my own family escapes to our "home away from home" and drives through the SR gate, we always know we have arrived when we see the Duck Inn. It is a welcome home for us. Over the years, we have watched the wildlife in the pond and been privileged to see some of the duck families enjoy this heartfelt shelter. As time and weather started to take their toll on the Duck Inn, we wondered what would happen, then it hit me, who better to rebuild this special SR symbol than our family. As we live in Nashville, we don't get to give back to SR as we would like, so we felt this was the perfect opportunity.

When we received the go-ahead from Smitty, we initiated operation "Duck Inn" on Sept 5th.

Because we wanted to make sure we saved the exact essence of the Duck Inn, we first created a handwritten template with measurements and took many photos. Then the disassembly began.

Although the structure was dire, it was harder to take down than imagined. (Maybe it was because it was all done by boat) We disposed of the entire Duck Inn except for the "wall of windows,"

which now resides at our SR barn. Once back home in Nashville, we rebuilt the replica and then disassembled and transported it back to SR. On Nov 24th, we reassembled the Duck Inn with the original "Duck Inn" sign. An additional goal will be to add a tin roof and build a ramp for the ducks. We will return in Jan 2022 for this final work.

While working on this project, we have wondered who the original person/family was who built the Duck Inn. In speaking to my Aunt Kathy Wilbanks, prior SR resident, she stated she only knew that Jim and Barbara Clinansmith (Oakwood) had rebuilt the Duck Inn. A very grateful thank you from our family to Jim and Barbara for the effort it took to create such a memorable shelter for our wildlife. I hope this article might bring out the additional history and close the loop. Until then, our family hopes the renewal will bring the residents of SR as much joy as it brings to us every time we drive through the gate and are welcomed home.

Walland School

After a year and a half, I finally was able to visit with Mrs. Sullivan – principal at Walland Elementary School. For all our new residents, Saddle Ridge has adopted the school for about the last 10 years and helped meet many of the school's needs financially. I've volunteered for the last 15 years with the 3rd grade to encourage reading fluency and improve their reading skills. Before the pandemic stopped me I was working with a 3rd grader who had just started at Walland. He had – due to nonexistent parental care – only attended 3 weeks of school in his whole life. The same applied to his 2 siblings. When we talked, I learned that "no" reading material existed in his home. Many of the children at the school have some kind of the same circumstances. And as all of us know if one cannot read one cannot get anywhere in life. So hopefully at school, I thought the library could help. But it was very depressing to me. The library lacked reading material that boys and girls would be drawn to and excited to read. It was dark and dreary in the daytime, and many books still were on the shelves from the days when the school went from first to twelfth grade.

But now take a second look at the pictures of the newly remodeled library. It is now bright, cheerful, and inviting. Mrs. Pitt tells the boys and girls to wander through, pull out a book and even sit down, look at it to see if they want to dive deeper and learn what the book is about. As you can see, though, many of the shelves are empty. Money is needed to replace what was removed.

The librarian is compiling a list to purchase. I will be receiving a copy of the list to share or purchase for them. As in the past, residents may contact me for books to purchase. Money may be donated which I take along with the tax-free number for Blount County Schools and buy what is needed. Checks may be written to Walland Elementary School and designated for books for the library. I am willing to pick up and deliver for you or you may deliver to the office. Mrs. Sullivan just had two requests. First, that you are willing to wear a mask. Mrs. Sullivan has just returned to the school herself from a very severe case of COVID (3 months). Second, that you please share your name and let them know you're from Saddle Ridge.

As we all know the season for giving is here. And for all of our new residents I've learned that all year, every year has been a season of giving for Saddle Ridge to the school. So if anyone wants to join us and play Santa again this year please contact me!
