People offer to let neighbors come stay at their house. So although it is inconvenient to be stuck at home for however long it lasts, we are fortunate to have the neighbors we do who offer to help.

And if I had to choose between loving Saddle Ridge for its beauty or for its people, I'd be hard-pressed to choose. I love living here for all the natural beauty. Whether it's snow in the winter, spring flowers popping up, or the fall colors, it's just gorgeous here. But when you have neighbors who help to care for you when you are sick, whether that's bringing food or weeding your garden, you know that you are blessed. People who check on you, bring a casserole, or feed your dog, are people that you are lucky to live near. And when you have a spring clean-up like we had in February and have so many people come to help that day, and who come two weekends later to run a chipper to clear mounds of branches, you know you have the best neighbors ever.

So I am happy to talk to potential buyers about Saddle Ridge. I can give them the unvarnished truth and still tell them how much I love it here. Sure there are inconveniences to living so far out of town — no pizza delivery, for instance, and at least a 30-minute drive when you get in your car no matter where you're going. But is it worth it? In my opinion, you bet it is, and I hope we all feel the same!

The Saddle Ridge POA Board has discussed the need to raise our annual POA fees by 10% beginning the next fiscal year, July 1, 2022. This increase had been approved by the board in 2012, but it was never implemented. As everyone is aware, the cost of just about everything has gone up. For Saddle Ridge, the cost of maintaining our roads has increased by 20% just this year. The new fee schedule would be \$275 for an undeveloped lot and \$550 for a developed lot.

WHAT OUR FORESTS WILL LOOK LIKE IN 10 YEARS?

Saddle Ridge's forests look different than they did just ten years ago. Most of our hemlocks have died and the few survivors are sickly versions of their former selves. If you see a healthy hemlock elsewhere you will be astounded by the vibrant green and dense foliage. Our white ash trees have fared much worse. Once one of the more common and larger trees in our forest, now nearly all our ash older than saplings are dead snags or logs laying on the ground. In both cases, exotic insects are responsible for these profound losses. Hemlock wooly adelgid and emerald ash borer are insects native to Asia that have been transported to and around North America. Because these pests and our trees didn't evolve together, our trees cannot mount an effective defense as they can to our native insects. Unfortunately, our native trees are easy pickings for these and other exotic pests and pathogens. There are treatments homeowners can take to protect the trees and there are considerable national efforts underway to conserve them. Perhaps the most impactful strategy is prevention. Preventing the spread of pests that are already here and the introduction of new tree pests by not moving firewood long distances (more than 50 miles for example) or by using kiln-dried firewood.

Some of the most visible trees and shrubs in Saddle Ridge are themselves invasive exotics. Our roadsides bear the brunt of the invasion. Some have pretty flowers like the mimosa tree. Another, a shrub especially common around the gate and lake, autumn olive, produces a fruit that birds and other wildlife eat. A third, Japanese knotweed, is planted in gardens for its showy flower display. Luckily, a neighbor spotted the first small patch of knotweed and it seems to be under control.

One could argue, what's the harm given their apparent values? The problem is these plants are described as "invasive" for a reason. They outcompete our native grasses, wildflowers, shrubs and trees. So unless we're ok with a monoculture of a few kinds of trees rather than our current diverse mix of trees found in our Smoky Mountains, we need to be vigilant.

What can we do? Avoid planting invasive vegetation. See here for a <u>list of invasive plants in TN</u>. Don't move firewood. And lastly, let me know if you have mimosa on or near your property or if you suspect you see knotweed so that they can be treated. If you're interested in treating this vegetation with herbicide please let me know (<u>alexjwyss1@gmail.com</u>). What will our forests look like ten years from now? In large part, the answer to that question depends on the actions that we take in the upcoming years.
